

#### REPORT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR OF 2023

Cortes Island Museum & Archives (CIMAS) respectfully acknowledges the toq qaymıxw (Klahoose), fə?amɛn qaymıxw (Tla'amin) and ?op qaymıxw (Homalco) First Nations upon whose traditional, ancestral territories its programs and activities take place. Cortes Island Museum and Archives Society (CIMAS) is committed to building the foundation for mutual understanding and positive relations.

2023 was the year people came out to embrace the beauty of this island. A flurry of community offerings and a boost of visitors to Cortes kept the CIMAS Board, staff, and volunteers busy. CIMAS was able to expand its reach to new audiences in person and digitally through a few key projects and programs. Highlights of the year include:

- **New Website.** In June 2023, we were pleased to launch a new version of our website, cortesmuseum.com. Funded by an SRD Grant-in-Aid and CIMAS Resiliency Funding, our site is easy to navigate and maintain, expands the reach of our programs and archives, and keeps members, visitors, and locals well informed.
- Creative Spaces Garden & Studio Tour. After a four-year hiatus, this annual fundraising and social event came back with a roar. Twenty-three artists and gardeners participated, and 147 tickets were sold. Stunning gardens from Whaletown to Smelt Bay were on the tour; beautiful handmade works, everything from textiles to paintings, were on display. Thank you to participants, local stores for selling tickets, and Gerri Davis for helping organize this very successful and fun event.
- Visioning Workshop. In October 2023, the Board and staff met to review our 2022–2024
   Detailed Work Plan (DWP). This was an important check-in to gather feedback on several key
   areas: individual and committee goals and projects, succession planning, a new programming
   model, capacity, finances, and the vision for CIMAS. Everyone's voice was heard, and their
   opinions were valued. Our 2022–2024 DWP has been updated.
- Wayfinding: Stories of Maps & Place. This was the first exhibition since 2018 to occupy the entire gallery. Melanie Boyle (as lead curator), the Exhibition Committee, and volunteers worked closely with the collections committees to feature many maps, documents, and artifacts many never before displayed. This exhibition was accompanied by special events throughout the year that featured a vintage or antique theme celebrating what is old is new again!

In 2023, we carried more local artists' works, redesigned displays and created new in-house products: tea towels and postcards (featuring archival images and photographs by Gary Fast and Christian Gronau. ## TOURIST/VISITOR INFORMATION BOOTH

CIMAS is the Destination BC Visitor Information Booth for Cortes Island. Centrally located at the Museum, we serve visitors and locals by providing maps, brochures, and information on local businesses, events, services, dining, and accommodation options. Material is available 24/7 on our covered porch and additional advertising service is available to local businesses through our ferry card rack. We will continue to expand our services and work with Cortes Community Economic Development Association (CCEDA) to support local businesses.

#### EXHIBITIONS, EVENTS AND TOURS

Public programming of exhibitions, special events, workshops, talks and tours in 2023 were engaging and accessible. Programs highlighted collections held at Museum and Wild Cortes and showcased the depth of talent and knowledge of community members. We had:

# WILD CORTES NATURAL HISTORY CENTRE

Wild Cortes Natural History Centre is housed in the Linnaea Education building. Programming, participation, and direction are provided through the collaboration of five organizations (Cortes Island Museum, Linnaea Farm Society, Friends of Cortes Island, Children's Forest Trust, and Discovery Islands Ecosystem Mapping Project) collectively known as the Cortes Wild! partnership. Curation of the exhibits is provided by Laurel Bohart, Donna Collins, Christian Gronau and Sabina Leader Mense.

## ARTIFACT COLLECTION

Committed to advancing best practices, the Artifacts Committee met weekly and accessioned 102 artifacts in 2023. We continue to work toward reconciliation with Klahoose First Nation through our overture to repatriate all Indigenous cultural objects currently held in the CIMAS collection.

## ARCHIVES COLLECTION

The Archives Collection consists of unique and original documents, photographs, maps, recorded interviews, digitized films, and ephemera dating from 1880s to present day. This year, the Archives Committee:

- received 12 new donations
- processed 14 accessions
- transcribed 70 digitized oral history interviews (12 corrected transcripts are available online)
- updated the Online Archives with new descriptions and digital record
- expanded the "Cortes Family Trees" project: genealogy of 22 families, with help from volunteer Bernice McGowan, now complete
- interviewed four island elders, part of an ongoing oral history project
- fielded 18 research requests
- participated in AABC webinar on reconciliation, "Relationship Building: A Guided Workbook"

Plans for 2024: Continue processing accessions, updating the Online Archives, adding to the Family Trees project and interviewing island elders.

#### HERITAGE GARDEN

A warm spring, summer and fall made it possible to enjoy a long 2023 season in the Heritage Garden. The garden was the setting for diverse events during summer and fall as part of the Art in the Garden series.

A new Heritage Garden Blog was posted on the Museum website describing settlement patterns in the late 1880s and the 1900s with many apple trees planted at homesteads up and own the coast and on Cortes Island. The three heritage apple trees in the heritage garden are a reminder of that time, and the blog includes a description of the trees and photos of the apples.

The apple trees were again pruned by volunteer Murray Rae; Debbie and Chris Dragseth mowed the lawn; and Nancy and Ray Kendel transported the sawdust needed to maintain pathways around raised beds in the garden. The drip irrigation system was maintained and repaired by Inga Schumann, and two members of Steph Asbeck's crew cleared the prolific growth of weeds and grasses in the front border. Steph controlled the very vigorous wisteria on the side fence which is a big seasonal feature of the garden. Garden development and maintenance is coordinated by volunteer and board member Donna McLaren.

Soil improvements are made each year and plants are added. Additions in 2023 included: peacock orchid (*Acidanthera bicolor*), another regal lily and wild bergamot in the front border, also coreopsis, gaillardia, and lavender added to the raised boxes for summer colour. Choice of plants is influenced by drought tolerance, bloom time and historical use.

#### ONLINE PRESENCE

The Online Presence Committee was established to analyze the CIMAS website and our social media accounts and make recommendations for additions and improvements.

A new version of our website, partially funded by an SRD Grant-in-Aid, was implemented in June 2023. The Web Smith (Campbell River) worked closely with Melanie and Gina with input from the Online Committee and the Board. In this new design, Wild Cortes received a top menu position with much more content.

2023 saw new blogs created by Mike Manson, Christian Gronau, George Sirk, and Donna McLaren. Thank you, authors! We are always looking for new blogs and contributors.

#### **Communications Updates**

In 2023 we moved to City West fibre optic internet provider. We also created new custom domain-based email addresses – cimas@cortesmuseum.com and museum@cortesmuseum.com. This idea was facilitated by Brian Scott as domain-based emails are free to registered non-profits via Google Workspace for Non-profits. Thank you, Brian!
